Expressing likes and dislikes

We can use the verbs like, love and hate to express different degrees of preference.

l like to jog/jogging.

They love music.

She hates to paint/painting.

We can use *don't like* with the subjects *I*, *you*, *we*, *you* and *they*, and *doesn't like* with the subjects *he*, *she* and *it*, to express dislikes.
