Second-conditional sentences

We use second-conditional sentences to express highly improbable or impossible facts in present situations.

We form second-conditional sentences with the simple past + would + the base form of the verb. For example: (Highly improbable): If I were a millionaire, I would buy an island.

(Impossible): If I were you, I would tell him the truth.

To express these unreal present situations, we use:

If + past tense, would + verb (base form)
